Description of Site

A division of Rhode Island Hospital, Hasbro Children's Hospital is the region's premiere provider of pediatric clinical care. The hospital offers a broad spectrum of both routine care and specialty programs not available elsewhere.

Hasbro Children's has the only pediatric emergency department, Level 1 Trauma Center, pediatric critical care teams, and 24-hour ambulance in the region. Psychologists are interdisciplinary team members of several hospital services, including outpatient specialty clinics, consultation-liaison, partial hospitalization, and inpatient psychiatric care.

Activities are distributed as follows: 70% clinical time, 20% research time, and 10% didactic time. The fellow will choose from 3 primary clinical positions for the year: Hasbro Partial Hospitalization Program [PHP], Hasbro Behavioral Health Inpatient Unit [BHU], or Consultation/Liaison service [C/L]. 28 hours per week of training will be spent on one of the intensive services above. Fellows will spend 8 hours per week in research activities and 4 hours per week in didactic activities (e.g., grand rounds, post doc seminar).

PHP provides multidisciplinary, family-systems-oriented treatment within a day hospital setting for children and adolescents ages 6-18 with complex medical and psychological needs (e.g., pain disorder with depression and school avoidance, eating disorder with trauma). Treatment enhances illness management and facilitates reintegration into normative activities. Trainees provide individual, group, and family therapy, with a focus on developing family therapy skills.

BHU is an inpatient psychiatric unit for adolescents ages 12-17. Patients often have co-morbid medical and psychiatric illnesses. The treatment goals are to increase functionality in the setting of debilitating physical illness (functional neurological symptom disorder, anorexia nervosa). Trainees will provide individual, group and family therapy. They will also participate in safety and aftercare planning.

CL provides consultation to pediatric medical providers regarding psychiatric and/or behavioral problems in patients admitted to Hasbro Children's Hospital. The fellow will conduct initial consultations and follow-up visits and assist in treatment planning and coordination of care.

Depending on patients' length of admission, there may be opportunities for family-based treatment.

Fellowship Aims

- To provide the fellow with specialized, post-doctoral, multidisciplinary training in the area of pediatric psychology.
- To provide the fellow with skills necessary to design and conduct psychosocial and behavioral research in pediatric psychology.
- To provide the fellow with advanced training in assessment and treatment (individual, family, and group-based) for children and adolescents with chronic illnesses and disabilities and their families.

Fellowship Timeline

The duration of the fellowship is 1 year. The anticipated start date is between July 1 and September 1 of the training year.

Clinical Activity Plan (70%)

70% of the Fellow's time will be devoted to clinical activities in one of the above described service areas. In order to ensure that the fellow receives a high level of clinical training in the area of assessment and treatment, the following activities will be required during the fellowship:

- Treatment services: All rotations (PHP, BHU, and C/L) include treatment services. The fellow will conduct evidence-based individual therapy. The Fellow will also supervise the provision of treatment services by a clinical psychology practicum student or resident (under the guidance of supervising faculty) for at least 2 months of the year.
- Clinical assessment: The Fellow will conduct clinical and diagnostic evaluations of children and adolescents (the PHP or BHU assessment process, consults for the C/L service).
- Clinical administration: The Fellow will participate in multidisciplinary rounds and staff
 meetings. Fellow will be actively involved in treatment planning in addition to completing all
 required documentation and clinical administrative duties.
- Licensure: The Fellow will apply for licensure as a Psychologist in the State of Rhode Island.

Research Activity Plan (20%)

20% of the Fellow's time will be spent on psychosocial and behavioral research in pediatric psychology. The fellow will be matched with a research supervisor based on their interests and experience. The Fellow will be exposed to various aspects of clinical research work in this area through participation in the following activities:

• Review of relevant literature and manuscript preparation and submission: The fellow will be encouraged to collaborate on manuscript preparation and/or poster submissions at local or

national conferences/research forums. Individually tailored goals will be established in this area.

 Study coordination: The Fellow will develop a research proposal and complete a project in an area of interest within the broad area of psychosocial and behavioral pediatric psychology research.

Didactics (10%)

10% time (4 hours/week) is available for supervision and mandatory didactics. If the optional didactic (Academic Friday) is chosen, this time will come out of the 20% research time.

Postdoctoral Seminars: The fellow will participate in post-doctoral seminars through the Postdoctoral Fellowship Training Program.

Mandatory Didactics:

Core Seminar Series (1 per month); DPHB Academic Grand Rounds (2 per month); Clinical Ethics Seminar Series (1 per month); and CCPSP Seminar Series (1 per week).

Optional Didactics:

Academic Friday-Grantsmanship, Special Topics in Statistics and Alcohol Center Seminars.

Supervision and Evaluation

The Fellow will receive two hours per week of individual supervision with two supervising psychologists – one with a supervisor on the intensive service and one with the fellowship coordinator. They will receive at least two hours per week of other structured clinical learning activities (e.g., group supervision, service rounds, etc.), and one hour a week for individual supervision with supervising psychologist on research.

At the conclusion and midpoint of the fellowship, the fellow and the supervisors will provide formal evaluations, and evaluations of the program relative to the goals and learning objectives of the fellowship.
